NPPC Hires New CEO

The National Pork Producers Council (NPPC) announced Bryan Humphreys has been chosen as the organization's new chief executive officer, effective Dec. 21, 2021, following the retirement of long-time leader Neil Dierks. Humphreys brings with him years of experience in the pork industry, including as a former NPPC employee, state association executive and National Pork Board senior vice

president, as well as outside the industry as a campaign operative, lobbyist and business owner.

Before joining NPPC, Humphreys worked at the National Pork Board (NPB) as a senior vice president. In this role, Humphreys oversaw a multimillion-dollar budget, implemented a nationwide producer outreach plan during the pandemic and strengthened relationships on behalf of the organization. In doing so,



Humphreys helped guide the organization to exceed expectations set by the industry.

Prior to his role at NPB, Humphreys served as the executive vice president of the Ohio Pork Council (OPC). At OPC, Humphreys cultivated award-winning producer image campaigns and fostered positive relationships with stakeholders and community members.

"For years, Bryan has been seen as a leader in the industry," NPPC President Jen Sorenson said. "His strategic thinking and unique experiences embody the type of leadership we, as an industry, need to guide us through challenging times ahead. On behalf of the board of directors, we are thrilled to welcome Bryan to the team."

Humphreys also served as the director of grassroots operations for NPPC and has several years of experience on political campaigns across the Midwest. Through these roles, Humphreys recruited advocates and volunteers to promote organization and campaign initiatives.

Humphreys is originally from Columbus Junction, Iowa, where he grew up on his family farm. Humphreys earned a bachelor's from Iowa State University and a master's degree from George Washington University. Today, Humphreys resides outside of Des Moines, Iowa, with his wife and son.

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Wisconsin Legislative Update

Legislature to Clarify Regulation of Aboveground Fuel Storage Tanks – Farm Tank Exemptions Preserved. In July 2019, the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection notified stakeholders that it would cease to regulate flammable and combustible liquid aboveground storage tanks that are less than 5,000 gallons on October 1, 2019.

This change resulted from a discovered conflict between language in an administrative rule and language in a statute. DATCP recommended a statutory change to align the rule with the statute and restore regulatory authority for aboveground fuel storage tanks over 110 gallons. However, the statute and rule also contained some very specific and important exemptions for farm tanks.

Accordingly, DATCP has worked with legislative officials and affected industry stakeholders this session to address this conflict in our law. Legislation has been introduced (Assembly Bill 384 / Senate Bill 381) to grant DATCP regulatory authority over all aboveground storage tanks over 110 gallons, while preserving the exemption for farm tanks under 5,000 gallons. AB 384 / SB 381, as amended, will restore DATCP's authority while also preserving the exemption for all aboveground farm fuel storage tanks under 5,000 gallons.

However, all farm tanks over 110 gallons will be required to register with DATCP. This is not a new requirement. This was required prior to 2019, as well. This notification requirement is meant to alert local fire departments that there is a fuel storage tank on the premises in the event of a fire. There is no fee or inspection requirement associated with this registration. (Note: Many local ordinances already require registration of aboveground fuel tanks with local fire districts.)

Agricultural Water Quality Legislation Introduced. Senator Rob Cowles (R-Green Bay) and Representative Joel Kitchens (R-Sturgeon Bay) have authored Senate Bill 667 / Assembly Bill 727 and Senate Bill 668 / Assembly Bill 728, which contain positive agricultural water quality initiatives for Wisconsin farmers. Wisconsin farmers want to be leaders in the development of improved water quality practices on farms. The programmatic changes and the new programs that are created in these bills will support farmerled conservation efforts that we have seen develop across Wisconsin. WPA supports both SB 677 and 678 and urges the Legislature to pass these bills.

Senate Bill 677. This bill creates a commercial nitrogen optimization pilot program to incentivize farmers to engage in new practices to reduce nitrogen on farms and

share what they learn as a part of those projects with other farmers across Wisconsin. This legislation creates a twoyear, \$1 million per year pilot program to award grants of up to \$50,000 to farmers for projects on their farm fields to optimize the use of commercial nitrogen. Similar to successful efforts in neighboring states, this legislation also creates a crop insurance premium rebate program where farmers not receiving funding from other state or federal programs may receive \$5 per acre to help offset the costs to plant cover crops. This program is funded at \$400,000 per year, beginning in the next fiscal year. The bill also funds a hydrogeologist position at UW-Extension. This position will continue to develop reliable soil depth to bedrock maps in Wisconsin so that cropping practices can be adjusted to meet the geology of particular regions and identify more areas that might be more susceptible to runoff.

Senate Bill 678. This legislation makes several important programmatic changes to the DNR's well compensation program that are necessary for increased eligibility for well compensation grants to address rural drinking water concerns. This program was funded in the 2021 biennial budget bill so that it can be utilized in by rural well owners who have elevated contaminant levels in their drinking water wells. The bill also contains several programmatic changes to the producer-led watershed grant program and the county conservation grant program are needed to further enhance the utilization of those programs.

Revision to NR 151 - Groundwater Nitrate Targeted Performance Standard - Will Not Move Forward. On November 17, 2021, the Department of Natural Resources sent an email to the members of the NR 151 Technical Advisory Committee informing them that, "The statutory process and associated firm timelines established by the Legislature for rule-making do not allow adequate time for the department to complete this proposed rule." The proposed revision to NR 151 was authorized to create a targeted performance standard for the application of nitrates/nitrogen to agricultural land in Wisconsin. The DNR would have to put forth a new Scope Statement and initiate a new rulemaking process if they choose to continue to develop this rule.

Terms expire at the annual meeting within the respective term year. Individuals with unexpired terms, a term with less than 3 years, are eligible to run for two full terms at the completion of their unexpired term. One full term is the completion of three (3) years on the board. Each district must have at least one producer director. There may be up to 6 at-large directors from any district. There must be at least one allied industry director, but no more than three.

WPA Reaffirm Resolutions 2022

22-1 Applied Agricultural Research – Motion: Whereas WPA supports ongoing scientific research in the areas of applied agricultural science, WPA:

Rationale: Pressure on Wisconsin farmers to change farming practices in response to a wide variety of environmental concerns is increasing. However, adaptation of farm practices must be based on sound science that accounts for and balances both economic and environmental concerns. As such, we need to continue to support and strengthen our applied agricultural research community in Wisconsin and in our university system.

22-2 Groundwater Quality – Motion: As the focus in Wisconsin increases on the sources, effects and remediation efforts to support quality groundwater, WPA:.

Rationale: Quality groundwater in Wisconsin is a statewide public health concern that potentially affects all WPA members, including its' continued growth and protection of the environment.

22-3 State Biennial Budget Issues – Motion: WPA supports continued state funding for the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) producer-led watershed grant program;

Rationale: These programs are important for the infrastructure of Wisconsin agriculture.

22-4 Livestock Siting – ATCP 51 – Motion: Whereas the existing livestock facility siting standard establishes regulatory certainty for new and expanding hog farms in Wisconsin through the use of clear statewide standards; WPA

Rationale: Following a four-year review of the Livestock Facility Siting Rule, DATCP has proposed revisions to the standard, which need further review and additional input from livestock farms, environmental groups, and local units of government in order to ensure that the livestock facility siting rule continues to provide an understandable and predictable process for siting new and expanding livestock farms across Wisconsin.

22-5 Animal Health – Motion: Whereas it is in the best interest of Wisconsin's swine industry to continue to explore options to mitigate impacts to the industry, WPA:

Rationale: Wisconsin is in the right position to take further steps to control and reduce the prevalence of diseases. Transportation funding for local roads

22-6 Local livestock moratoria and ordinances – Motion: Whereas WPA encourages planned agricultural growth at the local level, WPA:

Rationale: Fewer Wisconsin residents have direct links to agriculture and, as a result, have less knowledge about on-farm practices. Supporting a diverse agricultural economy that in-

cludes locally- grown commodities, organic farming, conventional agriculture and concentrated animal feeding operations, benefits all involved in agriculture. The State of Wisconsin provides local units of government with tools to regulate the siting of livestock operations through zoning and Wis. Admin. Code s. ATCP 51, the livestock facility siting standard.

22-7 Renewable Energy – Motion: As governments and communities begin to focus more on expanding sources of renewable energy, WPA is committed to producing pork in a sustainable way that:

Rationale: Wisconsin farmers recognize the need to support a strong foundation of voluntary energy stewardship investments and practices that are balanced against the needs of crop and livestock systems.

The USDA Risk Management Agency knows 2021 has been a difficult year for livestock producers. Though insurance does not solve every problem, it can be an important part of the risk management strategy employed by your operation.

If you do not have a current relationship with an agent, use the Agent Locator Tool to find an agent in your area. Approved Insurance Providers and their agents can help answer your questions as you try to find the best insurance solutions to meet the needs of your operation.

Some recent changes to the Livestock Risk Protection Program are:

Increased head limits to:

Swine – 40,000 head per endorsement/150,000 head an nually

Modified the livestock ownership requirement to 60 days Added endorsement length options up to 52 weeks for swine

Added new feeder cattle and swine types to allow for live stock to be insured before birth

Some recent changes to the Livestock Gross Margin Program are:

Modified the Expected Price Measurement Period definition and the Sale Period definition to allow for weekly sales; and

Clarified when the producer may seek arbitration
