# **State Fair Offered Plenty of Pork Positives**

The Wisconsin State Fair was held August 3<sup>rd</sup>- 13<sup>th</sup>, 2023. WPA's presence at the Wisconsin State Fair reached thousands of fairgoers with positive messaging and experiences through multiple activities, and of course, delicious pork items – all designed to leave consumers reaching for more pork long after the fair is over. Pork Schoppe 2023 sold 15,353 butterfly pork chop sandwiches, 5,343 chops on a stick and 3,388 pork burgers. That meant over 2,000 more chops on a stick and 500 more burgers than compared to 2022. We hope to brand the trailers for more excitement in 2024.


## Wisconsin Farm Technology Days Recap

# **Legislative Update**

Governor Evers Signs Two Ag Bills in August. On August 4, Governor Tony Evers signed two bills into law that support Wisconsin agriculture. The first, Senate Bill 66 (Act 28), was written by Senator Cory Tomczyk and Representative Jon Plummer. 2023 Act 28 extends the time that farmers can utilize the Farm Service Commercial Driver's License (CDL) from 180 days to 210 days. The state timeline for the Farm Service CDL now matches the federal standard, which was expanded to 210 days in the federal Bipartisan Infrastructure Law. The second bill, Assembly Bill 131 (Act 32), makes a critical change to the statutorily required composition of county land conservation committees to preserve farmer input on the committees. Under prior law, the county committees were required to include a representative from the U. S. Department of Agriculture Farm Service Agency (FSA) to represent farmer interests. Accordingly, this legislation amends the statute to require that the county committee instead include an individual engaged in actively farming.

Hearing Held on Farm and Industry Short Course (FISC) Legislation (SB 370 / AB 372). The Farm and Industry Short Course (FSC) was created at the University of Wisconsin-Madison in 1886. In 2022, UW-Madison announced that it would be ending this 16-week, farm oriented on-campus program and replacing it with online learning. After months of discussion with University System officials and Wisconsin agricultural organizations, UW-River Falls announced that it would take over the FISC program and maintain it as an on-campus learning program beginning in October 2023. However, one-time funding is needed to assist River Falls with this transition. Unfortunately, the funding was not included in the 2023-25 biennial budget bill. So, Senator Joan Ballweg and Representative Warren Petryk, along with a large group of bipartisan legislators, have introduced legislation that would provide \$372,980 over the next two years to move FISC to UW-River Falls. This bill is widely supported by farm organizations.

Legislation Directs Creation of Online Interactive Carbon Calculator for Wisconsin Farmers (LRB-2661/1 & LRB-4093/1). Representatives Loren Oldenburg, Travis Tranel, and Jeff Mursau and Senator Rob Cowles have drafted legislation that would direct DATCP to create a free, web-based carbon calculator for farmers to use to calculate the carbon emissions that are produced directly or indirectly from their agricultural activities. Establishing this uniform credit calculation method makes it easier for farmers and increases reliability and value of these credits in the free market. This proposal is a step towards rethinking the way Wisconsin businesses may voluntarily approach reducing their carbon footprint while simultaneously supporting farmers by finding a new market for them to choose to participate in for carbon emissions reduction practices.

# **Legislative Action Conference**

Pork producers from Wisconsin will be attending the Legislative Action Conference (LAC) in Washington D.C. on September  $12^{th} - 14^{th}$ . Here, they will visit with Wisconsin's congressional members to emphasize the significance and urgency of topics facing our industry such as Prop 12, the Farm Bill, agriculture labor, and foreign animal disease. # Five Wisconsin Counties Eligible for Disaster Assistance

This Presidential disaster declaration allows the USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) to extend much-needed emergency credit to producers recovering from natural disasters through emergency loans. Emergency loans can be used to meet various recovery needs including the replacement of essential items such as equipment or livestock, reorganization of a farming operation, or to refinance certain debts. FSA will review the loans based on the extent of losses, security available, and repayment ability. The five Wisconsin counties that are eligible for assistance are Burnett, Douglas, La Crosse, Pierce, and Vernon.

To file a Notice of Loss or to ask questions about available programs, contact your local USDA Service Center.



These grants aim to help farmers find and promote conservation solutions best suited for their watershed, based on topography, soil, types of operations, and other factors. # **Proposition 12 Update**

NPPC's Position:

- Livestock farmers, veterinarians and animal scientists work hard to follow industry standards and best practices to protect the welfare and health of animals in their care.
- Proposition 12 ignores scientific research and facts about animal husbandry, thereby reversing decades of progress on farm management and animal welfare.
- Proposition 12 will increase prices and shrink supplies of affordable protein for families inside and outside California while forcing consolidation within the livestock sector and the loss of family farms.
- > Proposition 12 is impacting longstanding relationships with foreign trading partners.
- > NPPC supports a federal solution to the sweeping issues posed by the Supreme Court's decision and Proposition 12.

#### Prop 12 Timeline:



Prop 12 is not science based. It was developed without input from hog farmers, vets or other experts in animal care and food safety. Prop 12 is a risk for food inflation and industry consolidation. Prop 12 creates conflict with trading partners.

Facts That Matter:

- New construction compliant with Prop 12 is estimated to cost \$4,000 per sow.
- It risks consolidation by forcing small and medium sized producers to absorb significant costs or be cut out of the California market.
- This issue is now in the hands of Congress to provide certainty and grant relief from 50-state patchwork of regulations.

During Congress' August recess, NPPC and state associations took advantage of the opportunity to discuss pertinent issues affecting the swine and agriculture industry with Congressional members.

## Federal Solution to Prop 12

• NPPC's Ask: We support a federal solution to the sweeping issues posed by the Supreme Court's decision and Proposition 12 and urge you to be part of that solution.

## Animal Health Priorities in the Farm Bill

• NPPC's Ask: We support the renewal and expansion of key Farm Bill programs that protect agriculture industries and consumers across the country.

## **Agriculture Labor**

• NPPC's Ask: The H-2A Visa must be strengthened to allow for year-round workers.
