**Sustainability & Image:** WPA strives to project a positive impression of the pork industry in the state. We have worked to develop a campaign to promote the We Care principles and take our message to groups throughout the state. **Legislative Presence:** WPA contracts with Jordan Lamb of the Welch Group to represent us at the state level. In addition, WPA works with National Pork Producers Council (NPPC) to address national issues. No Checkoff dollars are used for these efforts. Your support is crucial to continued resolutions on legislative issues at both the state and federal level.

#### 2023-24 Advocacy Issue Summary

#### **Successes in Wisconsin**

- Secured \$150 million in funding for an Agricultural Road Improvement Program (ARIP).
- Secured \$1 million in funding for the Nitrogen Optimization Pilot Grant Program (NOPP).
- Secured \$800,000 for Cover Crop Insurance Premium Rebates.
- Secured \$2 million for a Producer-led Watershed Grant Program.
- Secured \$3 million toward completion of the Food
   + Farm Exploration Center.
- Secured \$700,000 in funding for Wisconsin Livestock Identification Consortium (WLIC).
- Developed legislation to update Farmland Preservation Agreements and Tax Credits.
- Developed legislation that created a Commercial Driver Training Grant Program.

#### **NPPC's National Successes**

- Protected U.S. pork producers, veterinarians from misguided antimicrobial reduction target.
- Secured swine program funding in 2025
