WPA Spearheading Voluntary PEDv Pilot Program

Background

The AASV PEDV Elimination Task Force, led by Drs. Paul Yeske and Marisa Rotolo, has been tasked with exploring the feasibility of a potential pathway for a national PEDV eradication program for the U.S. swine herd. At the US SHIP House of Delegates Meeting in Bloomington, MN, in 2025, the task force presented a standard outlining sampled and testing guidelines for a voluntary high health standard called “PEDV Clean.” They also discussed a high-level pathway toward an eradication program leveraging U.S. SHIP. At the conclusion of the meeting, delegates approved the proposal to establish certification requirements for voluntary PEDV classification status within US SHIP.



To align with this program, WPA volunteered to be a pilot state to implement and explore the viability of the new PEDV Clean certification status within U.S. SHIP. After the repeal of Wisconsin’s Swine Health Rule earlier this year, the WPA Board and Swine Health Committee felt this pilot program would be a positive step forward in upholding and advancing the health of Wisconsin’s swine herd while creating a model for other states to follow.

Progress

In January, WPA began recruiting producers to participate in this voluntary pilot program. To date, we have 7 producers and 16 premises participating in the program. WPA collects diagnostic test results from producers, analyzes them, and shares the data with the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) Division of Animal Health who confirms and issues the certifications.

Looking Ahead

WPA continues to welcome participation from producers in Wisconsin. Ultimately, WPA is working toward establishing “PEDV-free” regions in our state and eventually across the country to work toward PEDV eradication. Wisconsin Legislative Session Wraps Up

The Wisconsin State Legislature has officially concluded its work for the 2025–26 legislative session. The State Assembly held its final floor period on February 20th, while the State Senate adjourned following its final regular session day on March 17th. Lawmakers briefly returned to Madison in May for a Special Session focused on a proposed tax relief and school funding compromise, but the package ultimately failed in the Senate. With adjournment complete, the Legislature is now fully finished with its work for the biennium and, barring extraordinary circumstances, will not reconvene until January 2027. As a result, all legislation that did not pass both houses is now considered “failed to pass” and would need to be reintroduced during the next legislative session.

Throughout the session, the Wisconsin Pork Association (WPA) worked closely with agricultural partners through the Wisconsin Agriculture Coalition to advance policies supporting Wisconsin farmers, livestock producers, veterinarians, and rural communities. Several significant measures affecting agriculture reached the governor’s desk, while others were vetoed or failed to receive final legislative approval.

Key Agricultural Legislation Enacted into Law

Rural Veterinary Loan Repayment Program (2025 Wisconsin Act 177). Governor Tony Evers signed Senate Bill 501 into law on April 2, 2026, creating a rural veterinary loan repayment grant program. The legislation establishes a targeted financial assistance program for veterinarians practicing in rural counties by helping repay educational loans incurred while earning a Doctor of Veterinary Medicine (DVM) degree.

Commercial Driver License (CDL) Training Grants (2025 Wisconsin Act 159). Senate Bill 783 expands eligibility for Wisconsin’s commercial driver grant program, allowing applicants other than training providers to access grant funding.

PFAS Response Programs and Farmer Protections (2025 Wisconsin Act 200). Assembly Bill 130 creates several new programs designed to address PFAS contamination while providing important liability protections for Wisconsin farmers. The legislation includes “innocent landowner” protections shielding farmers from spills law liability associated with spreading municipal waste containing PFAS when they did not cause the contamination.

Administrative Rules – A Major Focus this Session

In addition to legislative advocacy, WPA remained actively engaged in several significant administrative rulemakings that directly affect Wisconsin livestock producers. A couple of notable items related to the pork industry include:

WPA Supports Repeal of PRRS/PEDv Testing Requirements. In 2017, WPA worked with DATCP to establish testing requirements for Porcine Reproductive and Respiratory Syndrome (PRRS) and Porcine Epidemic Diarrhea Virus (PEDv) under ATPC 10. After seven years of monitoring, WPA worked with DATCP to repeal the testing requirements due to failure of the rule to reach its intended outcomes to reduce the prevalence of PRRS and PEDv in Wisconsin.

Concerns Remain About DATCP Animal Health Fee Increases. DATCP’s initial proposal included fee increases as high as 1,700%, creating significant concern among livestock markets, dealers, and producers statewide. WPA opposed the proposal, and testimony submitted during public hearings highlighted the potentially severe economic impacts. Following stakeholder feedback, DATCP released a revised proposal reducing the largest increases to approximately 60%. WPA will continue advocating for a more balanced funding model that combines General Purpose Revenue (GPR) support with modest, reasonable user fees consistent with practices in neighboring states.

Looking Ahead: 2026 Elections on the Horizon

With legislative activity concluded, attention now shifts to what could become one of the most consequential election cycles in Wisconsin in decades. In November 2026, voters will elect a new governor, all 99 members of the Wisconsin State Assembly and state senators representing the odd-numbered Senate districts. Governor Tony Evers’ retirement has created our first open gubernatorial race since 2010.

Legislative control is also at stake. Republicans currently hold an 18-15 majority in the State Senate, where Democrats need a net gain of two seats to secure control. Several Republican-held districts have become increasingly competitive under Wisconsin's new legislative maps. In the Assembly, Republicans hold a 54-45 majority. Democrats would need to gain five seats to win control of the chamber.

Beyond partisan control, Wisconsin agriculture will also be navigating significant leadership turnover. Several senior Republican leaders have announced retirements, including Senate Majority Leader Devin LeMahieu, Senator Steve Nass, Senator Rob Hutton, Senator Van Wanggaard, and Assembly Speaker Robin Vos. Regardless of which party controls state government in 2027, Wisconsin agriculture's continued success will depend on maintaining strong bipartisan relationships and ensuring policymakers understand agriculture's critical role in Wisconsin's economy, food supply, export markets, and rural communities. As a new generation of legislative leaders emerges, WPA will continue serving as a trusted voice for Wisconsin pork producers and advocating for policies that strengthen the long-term competitiveness and sustainability of Wisconsin agriculture.

NPPC: Looking Ahead- 2026 Pork Policy Priorities

The **2026 Farm Bill** continues to be top of mind for NPPC as we look to Congress to pass the long-overdue bill. NPPC scored 100% of our asks in the House's 2026 Farm Bill, including a California Prop. 12 fix, which would limit such laws to be applicable only in the states in which they were passed.



We overcame a major hurdle, as the House Farm Bill passed in April included bipartisan support. Now, we look to the Senate and are advocating daily for as many wins as possible in the Senate bill. Once it passes the Senate, the two versions of the bill must be reconciled in a conference committee before a final bicameral farm bill can be passed and sent to the president to sign into law.

NPPC produced another major win within the **Make America Healthy Again** agenda, as the Dietary Guidelines for Americans flipped the traditional food pyramid and put red meat back on the plate. However, the fight is not over. The definition for "ultra-processed foods" is under review at the White House Office of Management and Budget. NPPC requests a science-based definition to maintain Americans' access to nutrient dense foods—like pork!

We all know a reliable, stable **workforce** is vital to the pork industry's success, and despite higher wages and competitive benefits, employment has declined the past five years. Protecting access to the TN visa program and expanding access to the H-2A visa program are crucial for the future of the pork industry. NPPC expects House Agriculture Committee Chairman G.T. Thompson's (R-PA) bill to include recommendations by the Committee's Labor Working Group, with which NPPC partnered closely.

In another victory for pork producers, the House has passed its **agricultural appropriations bill**, which funds important industry programs. NPPC's asks were granted in the bill, including funding for the U.S. Swine Health Improvement Plan to improve the health and marketability of pigs and pork products; USDA's Market Access Program and Foreign Market Development Program to boost exports; Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service to protect American agriculture from foreign pests and diseases, including funds for port of entry inspections for New World screwworm; and Food Safety and Inspection Service to fund meat inspectors.

With the emergence of **New World screwworm** in the United States, NPPC continues to be proactively engaged on preparedness and prevention, working with USDA, EPA, the American Association of Swine Veterinarians, the Swine Health Information Center, and the National Pork Board to educate producers and strengthen industry preparedness. NPPC also helped ensure pork industry recommendations were incorporated into the updated response playbook.

On international trade, NPPC is actively monitoring discussions on the mandatory **U.S.-Mexico-Canada Agreement** review process this summer and has submitted multiple sets of formal comments. It is imperative all three countries renew the trade pact, as losing it would jeopardize one-third of U.S. pork exports and threaten the North American collaboration if foreign animal diseases emerge. NPPC will continue to monitor and make progress on these—and more—issues while collaborating with WPA.

NPB: National Swine Health Strategy

This effort is built around practical steps producers can use every day to reduce disease pressure, strengthen preparedness and keep operations moving. The tools matter, but progress also depends on the small decisions made on farms across the country every day.

That's why the Pork Checkoff is all in on swine health. Not just developing a strategy, but bringing producers, veterinarians, researchers and industry partners together around common goals and coordinated action. This isn't something happening around you. It's something that works because of you. That's how individual effort turns into industry progress. It won't be simple, and it won't happen overnight. But it's important work in front of us.

Prepare for the Unexpected: Join U.S. SHIP

The United State Department of Agriculture (USDA) transferred oversight of the U.S. SHIP program to State Animal Health Offices (SAHOs) in 2025. The Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (WI-DATCP) Division of Animal Health (DAH) is now responsible for managing the U.S. SHIP program in Wisconsin.



This voluntary free program is a collaborative effort with industry, state, and federal partners to improve the health and marketability of U.S. swine and pork products. U.S. SHIP provides a national platform for standards defined and updated annually by stakeholders. Joining the U.S. SHIP program benefits swine producers for several reasons, including:

- Improving biosecurity, traceability, and disease surveillance for swine health.
- Mitigating the incursion risks of African Swine Fever (ASF) and Classical Swine Fever (CSF) which is crucial for maintaining the health and marketability of U.S. swine.
- Allowing producers to obtain voluntary health certification of disease-monitored status for ASF and CSF.
- Limiting disruptions to international and interstate commerce should U.S. outbreaks occur.
- Maintaining or resuming continuity of business for U.S. SHIP participating stakeholders whenever possible should an incursion occur.

In an evolving animal health landscape, taking steps to prepare and protect your operation is more important than ever. U.S. SHIP offers a structured yet flexible approach to help stakeholders reduce risk and maintain stability in the face of potential challenges. The program is designed to work alongside your existing management practices. Participation not only benefits individual operations, but also contributes to a stronger, more coordinated response locally, regionally, and across the national swine industry.
